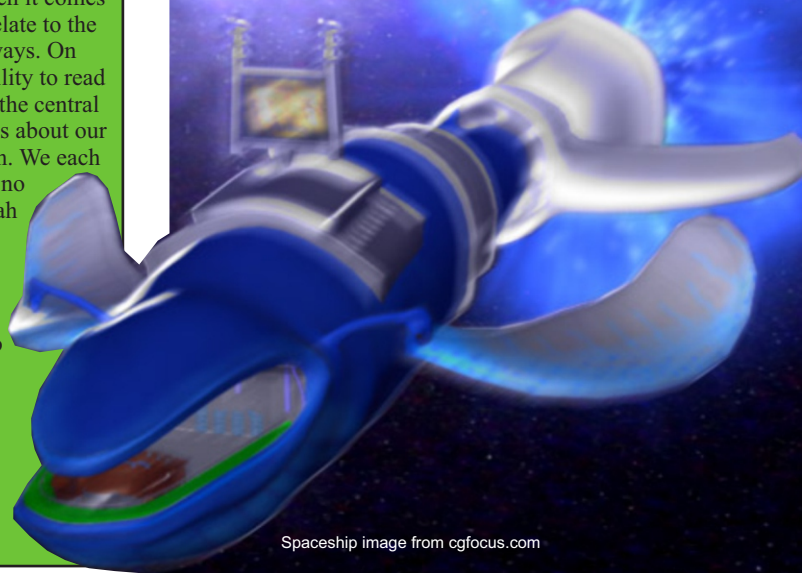
And THAT'S reason to celebrate!
